Ticks: Life Cycle, Anatomy & Disease Transmission

Ticks are a common external (on the skin) parasite of many animals, including dogs.

What are ticks?

Ticks are not insects like fleas, flies, and lice, but are arachnids like mites and spiders. There are approximately 850 species of ticks worldwide. Scientists have classified ticks into two families based upon their structure: Ixodidae and Argasidae.

Ixodid ticks

The tick family lxodidae consists of ticks that have a hard outer covering called a 'scutum,' and therefore, are termed 'hard-shelled ticks'. Table 1 lists the most important hard-shelled ticks for dogs and cats.

Argasid ticks

The family Argasidae contains the argasid ticks, which are soft-shelled. Their body lacks a scutum. An argasid has its head located ventrally (on the underside of its body) and when the tick is viewed from above, the head cannot be seen. The soft-shelled ticks or Argasids are fewer in number. The one most known is *Otobius megnini*, also known as the Spinose Ear Tick. It is most common in the Southwest and usually attaches to the ears of animals.

What are the anatomical features of ticks?


All ticks have three pairs of legs during the immature stage and four pairs as an adult. They crawl but cannot fly since they

have no wings. Ticks possess a sensory apparatus called 'Haller's organ.' This structure senses odor, heat, and humidity. This is how the ticks locate their food source. They climb upon tall grass and when they sense an animal is close by, they crawl on.

What do ticks eat?

A tick's diet consists of blood and only blood. The tick imbeds its mouthparts into the animal's (or human's) skin and sucks the blood. Except for the eggs, ticks require a blood meal to progress to each successive stage in their life cycle.

What is the life cycle of a tick?



Most ticks are what we call three *host* ticks, that is, during their development which takes two years, they feed on three different hosts. All ticks have four stages to their life cycle: egg, *larvae* (seed tick), nymph, and adult. Let us look at the life cycle of the deer tick, as an example.

Adult female deer ticks lay eggs on the ground in spring. Later in the summer (depending on moisture and temperature), the eggs hatch into larvae. The larvae, which are smaller than the period at the end of this sentence, find an animal (the first host, which is usually a bird or rodent), live off its blood for several days, then detach and fall back onto the ground. For deer ticks, this most commonly occurs in the month of August. In the ground, the well-fed larvae now molt into the next stage and are called nymphs.

The nymphs remain inactive during the winter months and in spring become active. The nymph now finds an animal (the second host - a rodent, pet, or human) and feeds again. Once well fed, the nymph detaches and falls back to the ground. Here it molts and changes into an adult. Throughout the fall, both adult male and female ticks now find another animal

Each female tick lays approximately 3,000 eggs.

(the third host - a rodent, deer, pet, or human) and feed on blood and mate. Once well fed, both males and females fall back to the ground. The male now dies and the female lives through the winter and lays eggs in the spring, completing the cycle. If the adults cannot find a host animal to feed on in the fall, they will survive in the leaf litter until the next spring when they will feed, mate, and produce eggs.

Other species of ticks may be at peak activity for each life stage at different times of the year than the deer tick we described. Your local university or health department may have information on peak tick activity in your area.

What diseases do ticks transmit?

Ticks can transmit or cause:

- Babesiosis (Piroplasmosis)
- Cytauxzoonosis
- Ehrlichiosis
- Haemobartonellosis in Dogs and Cats
- Hepatozoonosis
- Lyme Disease
- Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever
- Tick Paralysis
- Tularemia in Dogs and Cats

GSDC MSP Performance Training Class Descriptions

Effective 4/17/2009

S.T.A.R. Puppy Class :

As a precursor to the Canine Good Citizen (CGC) evaluation through AKC, we are proud to offer the S.T.A.R. puppy program. This class is designed for puppies 2-6 months of age. It comprises 6 weekly lessons. The focus of this class is education in responsible dog ownership, socialization with people and other dogs and basic training in manners and good behavior.

This class follows the AKC guidelines and upon completion students will be eligible to take the S.T.A.R. puppy evaluation (these will be held approximately every 2 months). If the AKC S.T.A.R. PUPPY evaluation is passed, your puppy may receive a certificate and medal from AKC (for an additional fee payable to AKC). In addition to the AKC's guidelines, we also incorporate knowledge of the GSD breed and work with you to develop an appropriate life long plan for your puppy to aid in their development as a well mannered, confident and happy German Shepherd Dog.

The cost is \$24 per block for GSDCMSP members; \$30 for non-members. No prior training or handling experience is required. After the first block, additional lessons can be purchased for \$4 for members; \$5 for non-members.

Beginning Obedience Class :

The Beginning Obedience course is designed for dogs and puppies at least 6 months of age. It comprises 10 weekly lessons focused on teaching the handler/dog team the basic Companion Dog exercises of heel, sit, down, stay, come, and stand for examination. No previous training is required to participate in this class, but previous puppy socialization and basic leash training is desirable. Unused lessons cannot be carried over to another class.

Intermediate & Pre- Novice Obedience Class:

This course is designed for dogs and puppies at least 6 months of age who have completed a basic 8-10 week obedience course. It comprises blocks of 10 weekly lessons focused on the basic pre-Novice exercises of heel, sit, down, stay, come, and stand for examination. It is intended to be a transition from the beginners obedience to the new AKC pre-novice level.

Competition Obedience Class:

This course is designed for dogs whom have completed at least 16-20 weeks of basic obedience training and have approval of the trainers. It will be offered if 4 or more students have active blocks. It comprises blocks of 10 weekly lessons focused on preparing for AKC competition in Companion Dog exercises of heel, sit, down, stay, come, and stand for examination. It includes on & off-lead heeling, recall, and figure 8, polishing footwork, rules for competition, and may include preparation for AKC Open obedience exercises of drop on recall, retrieving, and jumping.

Rally Obedience Class:

The Rally Obedience course is designed for puppies at least 6 months of age. It comprises blocks of 10 weekly lessons focused on teaching the moves, rules, and scoring of Rally Obedience, and providing experience on practice courses. A basic 8-10 week beginner's obedience class or trainer approval is required to participate in the class.

Connie will spend some time on day 1 discussing how dogs learn, and the remainder of the 2 days will be spent addressing participant questions and training problems. - Verna motioned to cancel classes on July 3rd; it was seconded and carried unanimously.




Herding Fun Days May 17 and 24

From I35 North: Take 35 North to Exit 165/County Road 70 (Rock Creek Exit). Head east (right) till you reach the 4 way stop. At the stop take 361 North (left). GSDCMSP Geocaching Event and Picnic May 30



Our first club geocaching event will be May 30 (no that is NOT Memorial Day Weekend!) at Afton State Park. We will gather at the Rangers Station just inside the park gates at 9:30 AM. I have reserved 4 of the GPS units for that day for our members and if we need more they are on a first come first serve basis. Some of us have our own handheld units already and you don't have to be the person holding a GPS to be the one who finds the caches. I talked to Ranger Rachel and this is a four part multi cache this year and they have selected easier terrain. Mulitcache means that when you find the first one it gives you the coordinates for the next one and so on, until you find all four. In the fourth cache there will be a card that you can keep to show that you have completed the hunt.

There will be various trinkets in the caches and you can trade for those if you wish. These are usually anything from small toys, to collapsible dog bowls. I have even found a dollar bill. If you look at the Minnesota State Park web site, they have several articles on geocaching at the parks. To select a geocaching name for yourself and register your finds online, go to www.geocaching.com and sign up. You can get a free basic account or you can join for a yearly fee and then you have access to special features.

The ranger will help you get started with the GPS and several of us also have experience with these. I have been geocaching for nearly a year and have found approximately 150 caches in my spare time. They are everywhere! Some parks have 20 or 30 in them. Almost every park has at least one. They can be found on street corners and parking lots. If you sign in to <u>www.geocaching.com</u> you can look at maps of your area and see how many caches there are.

A few things to remember:

- We will be representing our club and our breed in public so please keep your dog under control.
- Please bring only one dog per person and be prepared to cleanup after the dog.
- It is a State law that dogs must be kept on leash and that the leash be no more than 6 feet in length. We could get into a real tangle if people use flexi leads.
- Park permits are required. You can get a day permit for \$5 per vehicle or a yearly permit \$25.
