Presented at the Awards Banquet and Annual Meeting on Saturday January 18, 2020

Did you and your dogs earn [AKC titles](#) during the 2019 year? If yes, please fill out the attached form to be recognized at the GSDCMSP Awards Banquet and Annual Meeting on Saturday, Jan. 18, 2020. The GSDCMSP is honored to recognize its members for their efforts in training, exhibiting, and ultimately earning titles with their dogs.

Eligible Titles/Awards: The Club shall present an award for all performance and conformation titles issued by the [American Kennel Club](#) and the Canadian Kennel Club. Awards are also given by the Club for titles earned at the American National Specialty Show, and titles earned from the GSDCA, including conformation, obedience, herding and agility: Grand Victor and Victrix, Select or Select Excellent, Futurity/Maturity Victor/Victrix, Winner's Dog / Bitch, Best Junior Handler, Best Puppy, Top Ten Stud Dog/Brood Bitch, ROM, Highest Scoring German Shepherd Dog in Regular Obedience Classes, Highest Scoring Champion in Obedience, High in Herding Trial, High in Agility Trial, Performance Award of Merit, Award of Excellence (AOE) and High in Tracking Trial, etc. Awards are also given for appearances in the annual Redbook Top 10 Futurity Sires and Dams, and the Top 10 AKC Major Pointed Sires and Dams.

In 2017, the membership voted to also include awards at our Awards Banquet to members earning performance titles with other reputable canine performance organizations (non-AKC) in Agility, Barn Hunt, Canine Freestyle, Dock Diving, Herding, Lure Coursing, Nosework, Obedience, Schutzhund/IPO, Rally, Weight Pull (see full list on page 2).

For certificates honored at the AKC and GSDCA level, the Club acknowledges the certificate in the Awards Program booklet in the "Honorable Mention" section. Examples include: Temperament Certification, Top 20 recognition, Herding Instinct Test, the Achiever Dog award that AKC is currently piloting, and other such certifications and awards.

Eligible Members: These awards will be presented to members of the GSDCMSP in good standing. This requirement may be met by being a Member in good standing at either the time the award is earned or at the date of the Annual Banquet at which the award is to be given or by becoming a Member Applicant by the date of the Annual Banquet at which the award is presented.

Plaques and Bars: The Club will present **one plaque per members' dog for their first award**. Any additional awards presented by the Club to that same dog, for the life of the dog, will be in the form of a bar, which is hung from the bottom of the plaque; however, a member may purchase a plaque instead of a bar each year for the difference in cost to the Club. Members and co-owners may purchase duplicates. Members may create an award for those titles not recognized by the GSDCMSP at the cost equal to the amount billed to the Club.

Please submit the required information for titles earned in the ~~2018~~ calendar year to have your plaque (or bar) ordered and ready to be presented at the Awards Banquet on ~~January 21, 2020~~ (each dog's first award is paid for by the Club).

Wonder Dogs: 101 German Shepherd Dog Films, Jordan Taylor, Reel Dogs Press, 2009.

On Dogs: An Anthology, introduced by Tracey Ullman, Notting Hill Editions, 2019.

Dogs in Art, Susie Green, Reaktion Books, 2019.

This seems a perfect time of year to recommend books as gifts for those of us who live in the dog world. We all have our love of dogs in common but there is something for everyone in these three volumes chosen for December.

Wonder Dogs makes a great reference book for that German Shepherd lover in your gift circle. Jordan Taylor gives all the appropriate information about each film, including the real name of the GSD actor and his/her trainer. If anyone cares, the principle human actors are listed as well! Taylor admits these films are

just a fraction of the hundreds, perhaps thousands of German Shepherd films produced since 1921 but her sense of humor in recounting the sometimes jaw-dropping inanity of some of the plots makes for fun reading.

The author clearly has a more than passing acquaintance with our breed, because she is careful to characterize the German Shepherd star of each film by correct color and coat description. In *Sign of the Wolf* (1941), for example, Taylor notes that Grey Shadow, the star, is an 'unusual-looking, black sable shepherd with pale eyes.'

I found it most interesting to see the photographs sprinkled throughout the volume which clearly track the development of the German Shepherd, at least in popular eyes, through the 20th and early 21st centuries. Taylor is brave enough to trace the evolution of Rin Tin Tin though the decades and provides several pictures of the various dogs.

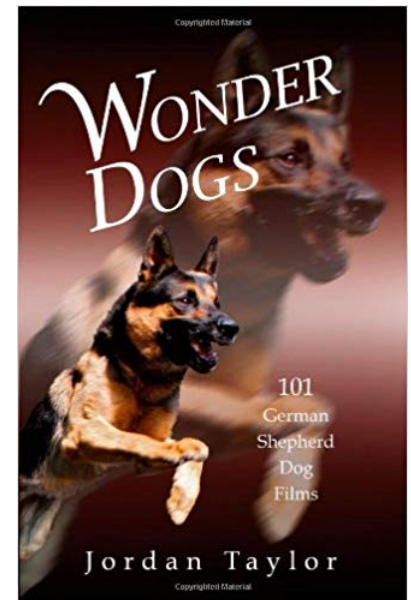
This book is perfect for those on your list who are German Shepherd lovers and who like film, especially from vintage eras. Although not comprehensive, I was impressed that she included *Kommisar Rex*. This is a popular Austrian television series featuring a gorgeous red and black male who is clearly smarter than his human detective sidekick. After watching a couple of episodes, I would also say that Rex is a better actor, too.

If your tastes run to the literary rather than to moving images, you can't miss with *On Dogs: An Anthology*. This is a lovely little volume with a kicky introduction by the wonderfully comic Tracey Ullman and the selections are just as quirky. Who would have expected to read pieces on dogs by William Shakespeare, Virginia Woolf and Alice Walker alongside small gems by David Sedaris and Brigitte Bardot? This beautifully produced book even has an attached ribbon to mark your place and it seems to be perfectly destined to sit atop your nightstand—or in the smallest room in your house—to entertain in tiny bites.

If, like me, your attention is always drawn to the visual arts, you may wish to get one copy of *Dogs in Art* for yourself as well as one to give to a loved one. The reproductions are carefully done, with the black and white pictures sharp enough to see the details and the color plates sumptuous. As one would expect from this publisher, the text is scholarly in detail but written with a general audience in mind.

I was delighted to find that the illustrations are not focused only on Western art but also have a decent representation of cultures worldwide as well as in history. There are many illustrations which cause the reader to stop and stare in wonder; my attention was arrested by a painting of Shiva (c. 1820) riding a giant parrot with a faithful dog scampering ahead. But the reader will be best rewarded by reading Susie Green's excellent narration which divides her vast topic into subjects which help us understand the various roles that dogs have assumed in art and in human life over two millennia. This volume is staying with me for the foreseeable future; I'll have to find something else for my sister.

Canine and Feline First Aid Course

Six club members attended the Canine and Feline First Aid Course on November 8 presented by Christopher Otto of Red Cape CPR. Lecture was interspersed with videos of various procedures. We had hands on practice with stuffed dogs learning to create a makeshift muzzle, bandage a leg injury, check the pulse in the femoral artery, how to move an injured dog, and give CPR. As a final test we each acted out coming upon a dog that was down with no pulse and not breathing. We followed the procedure giving compression, breathing into the nose and simulated calling the vet. We received certificates following the training and we also received a Pet CPR Student Handbook.

There is an APCC mobile App from the Animal Poison Control that is a free Download. This app contains a searchable database of hundreds of different substances including but not limited to: household hazards, medications and warm and cold weather toxins commonly found in or around an animal's surroundings.

Details for each toxin including: scientific name, common names, sample images, severity of exposure and potential symptoms for at-risk dogs, cats, horses, and birds.

Color-coding to help you identify the toxins of most concern.

Chocolate and rodenticide poison calculators to determine severity level.

One-touch speed-dialing to the ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center.

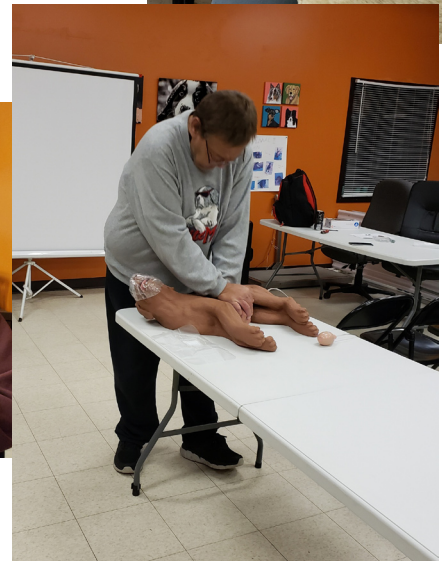

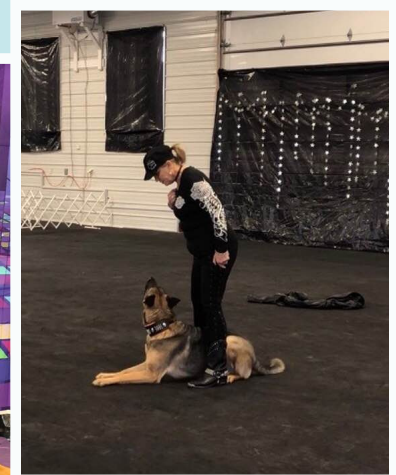
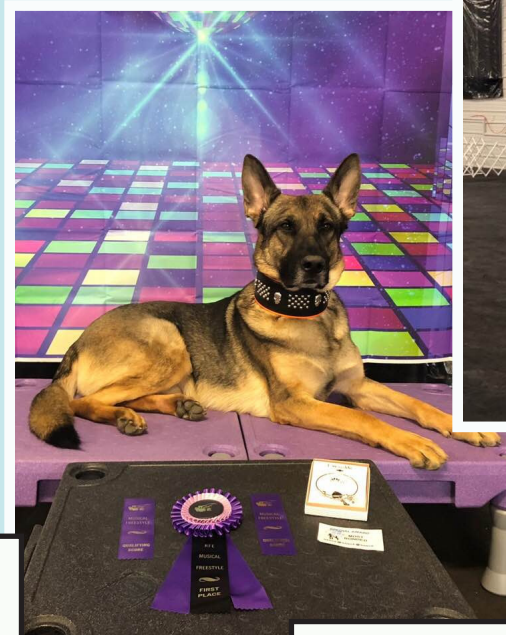

Hope for degenerative myelopathy

Learn more about genetic testing for degenerative myelopathy and discover what Morris Animal Foundation is doing to help in the battle against this disease.

For many practitioners, degenerative myelopathy is a frustrating and heartbreaking disease. Frustrating because the diagnosis is a challenge and no treatment options exist beyond supportive care. Heartbreaking because of the disease's relentless, cruel progression. However, the last decade has brought a quantum leap in our understanding of this disease, a new diagnostic test, and renewed efforts to find a treatment that could substantially impact the quality of life for our patients afflicted by DM.

Researchers have searched for a specific cause of degenerative myelopathy since the disease was first described 45 years ago. [Morris Animal Foundation](#) was an active supporter of many of these early studies, funding research focused on everything from vitamin deficiencies to viral infections. However, none of these avenues yielded a clear-cut cause for the disease.

Veterinarians have long recognized a breed predilection for DM. The advent of more sophisticated genetic tools in the early 1990s allowed researchers to explore the genetic underpinnings of the disease in greater detail. This, coupled with the discovery of a genetic mutation associated with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis in people, fueled more research to pinpoint a genetic basis for the disease. In 2009, researchers at the University of Missouri and the Broad Institute identified a mutation in the canine *SOD1* gene as the likely culprit, opening a new era in our understanding of the disease and providing hope for a potential treatment.

A screening test for *SODI* (including a variant unique to Bernese mountain dogs) is available to veterinarians and dog owners. The test can help estimate the risk for disease development but must be interpreted with caution, since data suggests that other genetic or environmental factors also are critical to the development of degenerative myelopathy. In addition, not all breeds with the mutation have been proven to have disease susceptibility. According to the Orthopedic Foundation for Animals, breeds that *have* met this level of scientific evidence are:

- American Eskimo dog
- Bernese mountain dog
- Borzoi
- Boxer
- Cardigan and Pembroke Welsh Corgi
- Chesapeake Bay retriever
- German shepherd dog
- Golden retriever
- Great Pyrenees
- Kerry blue terrier
- Poodle
- Pug
- Rhodesian ridgeback
- Shetland sheepdog
- Soft-coated wheaten terrier
- Wire fox terrier

Although genetic testing can help with diagnosis of DM, definitive diagnosis can still be challenging. Commonly used diagnostic tools such as X-rays, magnetic resonance imaging and spinal fluid analysis have all fallen short in definitively diagnosing this disease. Morris Animal Foundation-funded researchers at Cornell University are exploring the use of an advanced MRI technique, [diffusion tensor imaging](#). This tool may help detect subtle spinal cord changes and help in the diagnosis of degenerative myelopathy. This approach is successfully used to detect white matter lesion load in human patients with neurodegenerative disease. Early data using this new imaging technique in dogs is promising.

Despite promising advances in the diagnosis of DM and a greater understanding of how the *SODI* mutation contributes to pathogenesis, an effective treatment for DM remains elusive. Foundation-funded researchers at North Carolina State University are tackling this problem using a [new gene silencing technology](#). In a small clinical trial enrolling four client-owned dogs with degenerative myelopathy, researchers are seeing if they can reduce the expression of the mutated gene using this new technique. If effective with no adverse results, researchers will explore this strategy further as a potential novel therapy for dogs with degenerative myelopathy in clinical trials.

As research continues, supportive care and [physical rehabilitation](#) remain the cornerstones of treatment for this disease.

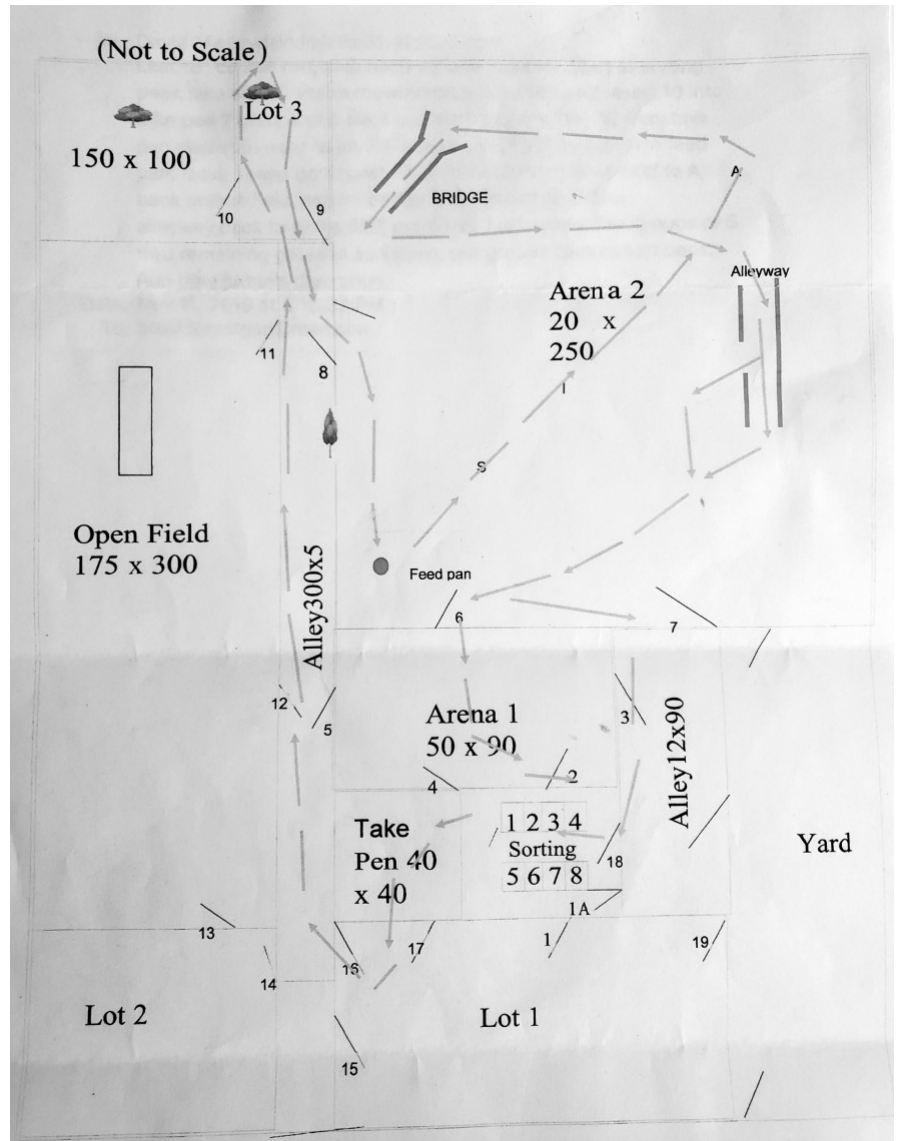

Sheep Herding D Course

David Mielke recently competed in a D Course Sheep herding trial and won. I wish I had been there to take pictures and video. When he described it was very impressed. Below is a diagram and Dave's description of this. Exercise.

Dave's narrative:

"D' Course run, club has 6 variable courses. Start at sorting pens, take out 20 sheep, move them to Take Pen and re-sort, 10 into take Pen, 2 groups of 5 back into sorting pens. Take 10 from Take Pen, down Alley Way to lot 3, around tree and back through Gate 8 to Feed Pan, leave sheep go to post, then fetch sheep across field through Alley Way, back to Gates 6 & 8, put 5 through both gates, then groups of 5 through remaining gates to Sort Pens, put groups back in Sort Pens, Run time at judges's discretion.

There are two types of membership. **Regular Members:** Minimum age of 18 years. Provided no objections have been filed within 30 days of publication in the Review, applicant will be notified that he/she is eligible for all privileges including the right to vote. **Junior Members:** Must be 10 years of age and not more than 18 years of age and shall subscribe to the same criteria as Regular Membership with the exception of the requirement to pay dues. Junior members cannot vote, hold office, or serve on committees other than Junior committees.
